Parashas Va'eira

When was the last time you spoke to that old friend of yours? You know, the one with whom you had a falling out. Neither one of you knows exactly how or why the fight started, but it just kept growing. And now you two don't speak. Which reminds me of a story about a frog. There are no princes in this story, but there is a Pharaoh.

In our *parsha*, Pharaoh implores Moshe to bring an end to the plague of frogs. The *Ohr Hachaim* explains that Pharaoh only made such a plea when he feared for his life. What was so threatening about these frogs that made Pharaoh fear for his life? Ibn Ezra points to several commentators who identify the *tzefarde'im* as a certain group of dangerous Nile-dwelling creatures, which left their watery habitat to attack Egypt. The Abarbanel considers these creatures to have been life-threatening. According to their description given by *Sefomo*, the *tzefarde'im* were apparently crocodiles.

But Ibn Ezra rejects these descriptions, as does Rashi. When learning about the plague of frogs in this week's *parsha*, the astute observer will note that one verse stands out. All other mentions of the plague of frogs refer to the creatures as *tzefarde'im*, in the plural. But in this *pasuk* (8:2) the Torah refers to *hatzefarde'a*, the (singular) frog.

Rashi addresses this curiosity with a *midrash* that says that originally there was indeed only one frog, but the Egyptians hit it and it multiplied into countless croaking frogs. Frogs filling the courtyards, fields, and houses of the Egyptians. Frogs eating Egyptians out of house and home. Frogs that jumped into the Egyptians' ovens and ate their baking bread. Frogs that even jumped inside their bodies and continued their incessant, maddening croaking.

But if there was only one frog that multiplied when it was hit, why didn't the Egyptians – who watched the frog population multiply at an alarming rate – just stop hitting it? Rav Yaakov Yisroel Kanievsky, the Steipler Gaon, z'l, answers this question with a penetrating look at the nature of anger: Even when logic and common-sense dictate that beating a magic frog, like a dead horse, gets you nowhere, people who are angry will do so anyway. Instead of accepting the situation and dealing with it appropriately, they lose any grip on common sense, even to the point of putting their own lives in jeopardy.

Anger causes us to alienate friends and family, and to miss out on positive opportunities. Let's think about this the next time we're enraged. Let's think about it over Shabbos. After *Havdalah*, let's give that old friend a call.

Va'eira: Stop the Craziness

It is quite unbelievable that Pharaoh can fail to learn over and over again. Every time, at the height of the plague, he sees his mistake, and sincerely decides to let the Jewish people go. But as soon as the pain has gone, he is back to his old tricks.

It seems crazy, but then again, don't we all do the same? We make mistakes and when we are feeling the pain of the consequences of those mistakes, we swear that we will never make the same mistake again. And we really do mean it – until next time that is, when the pain has subsided, and we make the same mistake again.

It's plain and simple human nature. You sit and watch absolutely nothing on TV till 3 a.m. on a workday, then swear that tomorrow will be different. And you really do mean it. Until tomorrow comes and the frustration has subsided, and you aren't tired anymore and there are some good programs on and ... at 3 a.m. you swear it will never happen again. Or you wake up with a hangover swearing never to drink again – until later that evening when you are offered a drink. Or you finish the whole cheesecake when on a diet. You feel sick and appalled at yourself and tell yourself that you are never going to even look at fattening food again because it is disgusting to you. And you do mean it at the time. But tomorrow's another day and the cheesecake looks so yummy again.

So, let's get back to Pharaoh. He's ready for another plague, just because the pain of the previous one has subsided? That's nuts. And when we do it, it's just as crazy. But we do have one advantage over Pharaoh. At least we know we are crazy!

Knowing we are crazy at least leaves us with the possibility of changing, even if it we don't take advantage of it right now. To think, like Pharaoh, that insanity is a normal way of living, is to walk into the asylum – and lock the doors behind us.
