#### Parashas Terumah

The parsha of Terumah discusses the building of the Mishkan, the portable Tabernacle that accompanied the Jews through their journey in the wilderness. Describing how the walls of the Tabernacle would stand, the text states, "The middle bar across the planks shall extend from end to end." The Targum Yonasan comments that this bar came from the tent of Avraham Avinu. In Shai LaTorah, Rabbi Shimon Miller, quoting his father, Rabbi Elimelech Miller, offers an insightful interpretation of this cryptic statement.

The Jews in the wilderness contributed gold and silver, wool, and skins to build the Mishkan and all that it contained, but it was this middle bar, which came from the tent of Avraham, that ran through the walls and kept the structure standing.

In his time, Avraham was renowned for his chesed (kindness), and continues to be the paragon for that trait. That the bar which propped up the Mishkan came from his tent provides us with an important principle: the Tabernacle can only stand if its foundation is kindness. This concept is clearly laid out in a mishnah in Avos, which states: "The world rests upon three things-on the Torah, on the service of G-d, and on acts of kindness."

The Beis Hamikdash had two of these pillars – the study of Torah and the Divine service of the priests – but the third pillar, the pillar of chesed is also necessary for the structure to survive.

William F. Buckley, Jr., the famed social and political commentator, once wrote of how impressed he was by the activities of the Jewish community in the United States on behalf of Soviet Jewry. The Jews of America, he wrote, are not related, in a narrow biological framework, to the Jews behind the Iron Curtain, yet they work hard to help, in a variety of ways, their co-religionists in the Soviet Union.

What prompted the American Jew to demonstrate outside the Soviet Mission and the United Nations? What prompted him to visit Jews in the Soviet Union and bring packages? The answer is one word, chesed. This principle must continue to be the guiding force of Jewish communal organizations and individuals. We must energize our efforts on behalf of others, constantly and consistently, and thereby rebuild the Holy Temple upon a foundation of Chesed.


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#### **Book Club Selects Next Book**

#### Be Happy... IT'S ADAR

The Hebrew name "Adar" is related to the word "adir," which denotes strength and power. The Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson, ZT"L, points out that the term "adir" is used to refer to the Jewish people and the month when the Jewish people's fortunes are strong. Adar was the last month the Jewish people spent in Egypt before the Exodus. Adar's joy is so great, in part, because it serves as the opening to an even greater rejoicing: the miracles of Passover.

#### **TERUMAH: The Temple at Home**

The ideal Jewish home is called "a small sanctuary." It has the quality of the Temple, a dwelling for G-d. This week's Torah reading describes the Sanctuary which Moses and the Jewish people were going to build. They constructed it before leaving the Sinai region and carried it with them throughout the forty years in the desert. Then they brought it into the Land of Israel. It was later replaced by the Temple built in Jerusalem.

In the command to build the Sanctuary, <u>G-d</u> tells Moses "They shall make for Me a Sanctuary, and I will dwell in them."

G-d does not say "I will dwell in *it*," in the Sanctuary, but "in *them.*" The Sages explain this means that G-d dwells in the heart of each Jewish man and woman. Each person is sacred, and the home in which they dwell is sacred.

The Sanctuary or Temple had three basic qualities which are potentially expressed in every Jewish home.

First, it was a source of <u>Torah</u> knowledge: in the Holy of Holies were the Tablets with the Ten Commandments brought by Moses from Sinai. Further, when Moses completed writing the Torah Scroll, one copy of the Torah was placed in the <u>Holy of Holies</u>.

Second, the Temple is termed a "House of Prayer." It is the Gate of Heaven, for all prayers pass through it to G-d. Throughout the generations, in whichever country they live, Jewish people face the Temple in <u>Jerusalem</u> when they pray. Inside the Temple, the service carried out every day expressed utter devotion to the Divine, the essence of prayer.

Third, in the Temple was a Golden Table on which were twelve loaves of bread to express the fact that G-d sends a flow of blessings into the world in order to provide every creature with its needs. This flow of blessing passes through the Temple, then radiates outwards to the world, giving food and sustenance to all.

Each of these three ideas relates in some way to the home. Let us see how.

The Jewish home today is a potential center for Torah study, where husband, wife and children regularly take the time to explore Torah teachings. Jewish books are part of the natural furniture, and many people organize an occasional Torah class or study group in their home.

What about prayer? Surely the main services are in the synagogue. But many prayers are said in the home: the morning prayers, blessings before and after eating, and the *Shema* before going to bed. And home is the ideal place to pray for those who do not attend the synagogue, for whatever reason.

G-d pours blessings into the Temple, from which they spread to the world. The Divine blessing which pours into the Jewish home is likewise shared, through warm hospitality and acts of goodness and kindness. The charity box in the home expresses this concept, as do all the deeds of generosity which take place there, reaching out to others as well.

Thus, the Jewish home is indeed "a small Sanctuary." Like the Temple, it is a center for Torah, prayer, and kindness. There, in the home as in the Temple, the Divine Presence dwells.


