Sedra Shemini

The word Shemini refers to the 8th day. It was the 8th day of the dedication of the Mishkan, the tabernacle, during the second year that our ancestors were in the desert. It should have been a time of great joy. However, tragedy occurred when two sons of Aharon, the Kohen Gadol, offered strange fire on the altar. They were punished and consumed by the fire. One of the reasons given by the Midrash for the death of Nadav and Avihu, the sons of Aharon, is that they entered the sanctuary after drinking wine. The Torah prohibits drinking by the Kohanim when they were "on duty".

The Dubner Magid, Rabbi Jacob ben Wolf Kranz of Dubro - 18th century Russia, explains the specific prohibition of drinking wine in the sanctuary with the following parable: "A baker and a physician, who were both seeking work, meet. The physician suggests that they travel together. The baker declines explaining – where there are sick people who need a physician, there is no market for his pastries... where there are healthy people, with healthy appetites, there is no need for a physician. In the same manner, wine and the sanctuary are opposites. Artificial stimulation of any sort, via wines or drugs, is necessary only when there is something basically wrong. If, however, everything is in order – if a person observes GD's commandments – and leads a proper life, he has no need for artificial stimulants." Nadav and Avihu may have felt that they needed to be stimulated artificially to serve Hashem. The motivation should have come from the heart, not from the strong drink.

What goes into the mouth is important from the health standpoint as well as from the religious view. Orthodoxy considers kashrus not only as a mitzvah, but also as a basic foundation of Judaism. Some of our great rabbis found fascinating moral lessons to be learned from the laws of kashrus. The Klei Yakor, Rabbi Shlomo Ephraim ben Aaron who lived in Czechoslovakia in the 17th century, states – "there are many non-kosher animals who do not chew their cud or do not have split hooves. Why has the pig become the symbol for Jews of all that is disgusting and abhorrent?" The answer is that the single most abominable trait, according to the Torah, is that of hypocrisy. Many animals which are unkosher do not have a cloven hoof, (e.g. - lion, tiger, bear, horse, camel, donkey, monkey, rabbit, squirrel, dog, cat, etc.). The pig has one of the signs of kashrus - a cloven hoof. It is the only animal that appears to be kosher on the outside and, only upon further investigation, is discovered to be non-kosher since it does not chew its cud. Thus, the pig is the symbol of the trait of hypocrisy which we should stay away from. The Ramban, Rabbi Moshe ben Nachman who lived in 13th century Spain, states that there is no general rule given in the Torah as to which fowl are kosher. The Ramban claims "those birds which are violent and cruel are prohibited because of the fear that we will learn from their ways and become violent ourselves".

Thus, the Torah emphasizes how strongly we are swayed by our environment. Just as we should be careful about the food we eat, so too should we be careful in choosing the books we read, the movies we see, the friends we make - avoiding those things which would have a damaging effect on character.

SHEMINI: Nutrition in the News: Is It Kosher?

It seems like I'm constantly reading about the new best "super" food. First, it was guinoa, followed by kale. Then, after stuffing my freezer with fresh fish, I read the warnings about mercury levels, and that I should never, ever buy farmed salmon.

Last month I read the benefits of a diet rich in proteins and low in carbohydrates. This month I was informed about harmful antibodies fed to animals and the dangers of excess animal fat. And, of course, the jury is still out on all the pros and cons of a writer's best friend—coffee.

Daily, we learn about new hidden toxins in our food. Is organic food safer? Are genetically modified grains dangerous? What are the effects of preservatives?

When it comes to nutrition, we are probably the most educated generation to date. We've become sensitized to the cause and effect of negative influences on or bodies, on our psyche and on our world.

The innocent-looking food doesn't appear dangerous. The harmless piece of chicken that was supposedly given antibodies looks exactly like the free-range, grain-fed poultry sold for double the price. And who could distinguish organic bananas from regular ones?

But as informed consumers, we recognize that it isn't only what we see that makes an impact. This is true in all areas of life, but nowhere is this more consequential than in the food we ingest, where the food actually becomes assimilated into our flesh.

So we've come to realize the subtle but potentially dire effects on our food, but do we ever consider our food's spiritual "profiles"? Does the food or drink that we consume affect us on a spiritual plane, on a soul level, influencing our character and natural tendencies?

This week's Parshah, Shemini, introduces the Torah's dietary laws. Kosher land animals must be slaughtered in a very specific manner and have split hooves and chew their cud. Fish need fins and scales, and there is a list of forbidden fowl. Notice how all kosher animals and fowl have the characteristics of being nonpredatory, peaceful and non-destructive.

Moreover, perhaps, the non-kosher animal's closed hoof represents a spiritual quality of rigidity—being closed off and untouched to the plight of others. Do the kosher animal's "split" and "open" hooves symbolize approachability and sensitivity, as well as receptiveness to growth? Does chewing its cud remind us how we too need to chew things over, and not be too quick or impulsive to judge?

Similarly, do the fins that propel a kosher fish forward represent its ambition, which needs to be tempered, like all of our ambitions, by protective scales representing integrity and principles?

On the surface, we may not be able to differentiate between many kosher and non-kosher foodstuffs. But on a spiritual and mystical level, the qualities of every creature affect us profoundly. Unkosher food may be just as physically nutritious, but its spiritual traits can clog our spiritual arteries from being able to assimilate a Torah consciousness.
